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Help Your Pups Beat the Heat

As the temperatures climb and we find ourselves in the dog days of summer, remember that the grill may not be the only place you find hot dogs this summer. Our neighborhood is home to plenty of four legged friends, most of whom enjoy the outdoors, a good walk or jog, and chasing a ball. Remember, though, that dogs don't regulate heat the same way that we do and are can be just as susceptible to overheating as we are.

When out for a run or jog with your dog, remember to pause often to give them water. If you're feeling tired or hot, chances are they are too. Try pouring water on their head and neck. If your dog wants to slow down, oblige them and keep an eye to make sure they're not showing signs of heat exhaustion.

In the backyard, make sure that your pup has adequate shade that allows for good airflow. While dog houses may provide the



shade your dog needs, no air will flow in or out of your pup's apartment, making it a hotbox. If possible, provide a small kiddie pool for your dog to cool off in. And, as always, provide plenty of water.

If your dog has long hair, consider a summer haircut to help them keep from overheating. Consider exercising your dog and yourself off of peak heat hours too.

Remember, cars build up heat extremely quickly and, even with the windows cracked, no pet or person should be left unattended.

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Frozen III: The Cold Snap Story Continues....

When I last wrote a blog article about last November's Cold Snap on December 23, 2014, I talked about the needle damage on evergreens along Colorado's Front Range. I related the story of our mild October weather and how temperatures went from the 50° F range to well below zero (-15°F in some areas) in 24 hours or less. Conifers hadn't acclimated to our cold winter temperatures and many needles froze and turned brown. Some trees had significant needle browning; many young trees were lost.

Since December, Extension professionals in the Front Range and Eastern Plains have been fielding calls from homeowners worried about their evergreens. Some questions have touched upon whether deciduous trees and shrubs were affected by the Cold Snap. Now that spring is here, we are seeing what appears to be Cold Snap damage to these landscape plants.

Thanks to CSU's PestServe list, green industry and Extension professionals as well as Colorado Master Gardeners and citizens have been chronicling the damage which has been observed on deciduous landscape plants. So far, the list of plants which demonstrate cold damage dieback, sometimes to the ground, is rather lengthy:

Trees: Fruit trees such as Apple, Pear, Cherry; *Pyrus calleryana*- Callery Pear – less blooms; *Prunus cerisifera* 'Newport'; Plums; *Salix* sp., especially Globe Willow

Conifers: Juniper, Arborvitae (in addition to previously observed damage to pines, spruces, etc)

Shrubs: Burning Bush (*Euonymus alatus* cultivars);

Cotoneaster species; Rose – cane dieback to ground; *Euonymus fortunei* cultivars; Boxwood (*Buxus* sp.), burned or damaged; Privet (*Ligustrum*); *Spirea*; *Weigela*; Buckthorn (*Rhamnus* sp.); Holly; Barberry (*Berberis* cultivars); *Daphne* (Carol Mackie cultivar); *Hibiscus syriacus*; and Silver Lace Vine *Polygonum aubertii*

As more trees and shrubs leaf out, we may continue to see damage from landscape plants that were affected by the November Cold Snap.

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Auto Maintenance Corner

As temperatures climb and traffic snarls, the last thing we often think about is the health of our vehicles. An oasis of air conditioning amidst a parking lot of gridlock, our vehicles provide us safety and comfort but can be just as susceptible to the heat as we are.

Remember to routinely check and change the fluids in your vehicles. Higher temperatures strain engines, especially when they're forced to climb mountain passes and roads, making lubrication essential to auto health. At high temperatures oil begins to breakdown and starts losing its lubricating capabilities, causing engines to bog and even lock up. Just as important as keeping your oil topped off and fresh is making sure that your engine's coolant is up to snuff. If it's been a while since the last time the coolant in your vehicle was replaced, try taking it to a garage to get the coolant flushed, or do it yourself. If taking this on yourself, be sure to consult your maintenance manuals and be sure to free as much air as possible from the system. Believe it or not the same coolant that keeps your engine from overheating can keep your air conditioning blowing cool.

Does your car spend a majority of the day outside? If so, regular washes will help to keep windows clear and the outside world visible. Regular washes also provide the opportunity to spot any scratches, dings, or damage to your car's exterior. If it's been a while since your last wash, consider selecting a car wash with undercarriage cleaning. Caustic road chemicals used for deicing can wreak havoc on exposed metal.

Remember to regularly check tire pressures and inspect the

treads for excessive wear. Use the penny test to gauge tire life. If Lincoln's head is still visible on a penny inserted into the tread upside down, it's time for new tires. With the heating and cooling of the day, air in tires can expand and contract, leaving an overinflated tire prone to excess stress in the heat and an underinflated tire to irregular wear during the morning commute.

One additional note on saving a little more at the gas pump, try to time your fill ups for the morning drive. Gas stations keep their gas in underground tanks, which cool in the evenings. As the gas cools, it becomes ever so slightly more dense, allowing you to get slightly more gas for your dollar if you fill up in the mornings.

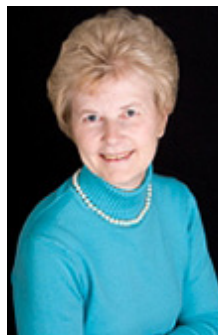
